NEW RUSSIAN SHORT FILMS PREMIERE IN NEW YORK AND COLORADO Award-winning filmmakers on residency co-hosted by CEC ArtsLink and the Telluride Film Festival

From Eisenstein's *Battleship Potemkin* to Tarkovsky's *Solaris*, Russian cinema captured the attention and imagination of audiences and fellow filmmakers throughout the 20th century. But whither Russian cinema now? While Hollywood-style Russian blockbusters have gained momentum in the post Soviet years, art-house film has quietly begun to develop its own new voices.

This September, CEC ArtsLink and the Telluride Film Festival partner to co-host a group of emerging filmmakers from Russia, selected in a competitive nomination process for a residency that will bring them to the Telluride Film Festival, as well as to Boulder, Colorado and New York City.

The screenings and the residency are part of the Open World Cultural Leaders Program, supported by the Open World Leadership Center at the Library of Congress with funding and partnership from the National Endowment for the Arts. This is the second summer that CEC ArtsLink and the Telluride Film Festival have partnered to host such a group.

During their stay in the U.S. the filmmakers will meet with their American counterparts, visit film departments in Colorado and New York, and take in the American cultural scene.
